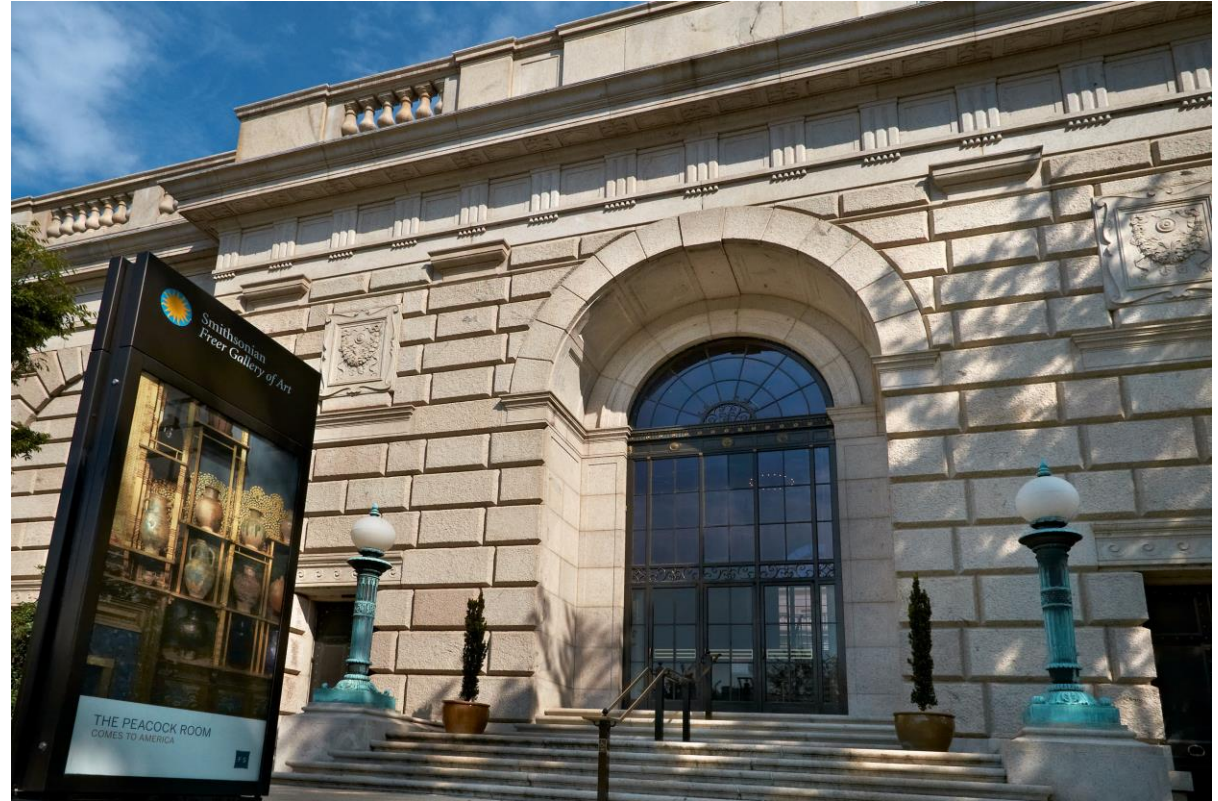


VISITING THE FREER GALLERY

The Freer Gallery is a big museum in Washington, D.C. The Freer is a part of the Smithsonian Institution, which is a group of museums.



Arrival

When visitors arrive at the Freer, they can use the entrance on Jefferson Dr. or the entrance on Independence Ave SW. The Accessible Entrance is on Independence Ave. SW.

Accessible Entrance & Elevator

The Accessible Entrance is located at the Freer Independence Entrance. Guests can use the elevator here to enter and exit the building.



Security

When visitors enter the museum, a security officer will look inside bags to make sure that nobody has anything dangerous. This helps keep everyone safe.



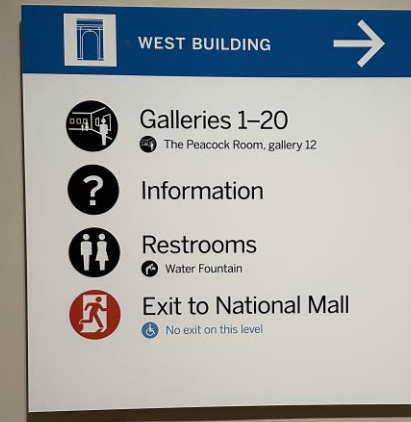
Lockers

The Freer Gallery has lockers and cubbies for visitors to store their belongings in while they visit the museum.



Signs

There are signs in the Freer that show visitors where they are and what there is to see on that floor. These signs are located throughout the museum.



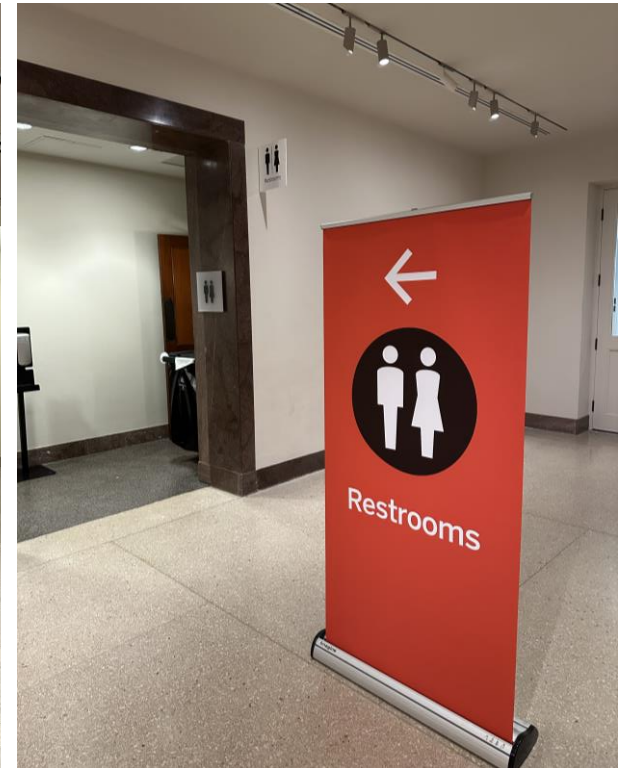
Stairs and Elevators

There are many stairs in the Freer Gallery. If visitors do not want to take the stairs, they can take the elevator.



Restrooms

At the Freer the restrooms are located on the levels GR and Ground Floor (G). Visitors can take the elevator or stairs to get to the restrooms.



Places to Rest

The Freer offers plenty of places to rest, with benches available throughout the galleries for visitors to sit and relax whenever they need a break.



Galleries

At the Freer, visitors can explore galleries featuring diverse art—such as Chinese paintings, Indian and Islamic works, Japanese lacquer, and Korean ceramics—as well as American art from the late 19th century and Whistler's Peacock Room



Freer Courtyard & Loggia

The Freer Garden is a peaceful Italian Renaissance-style courtyard, surrounded by plants and the gentle sound of a fountain. It's a quiet place to relax and reflect.

The loggia is an outdoor area connected to the courtyard.

A ramp on the east side of the courtyard provides accessible entry from the loggia.



Exploring with Eyes

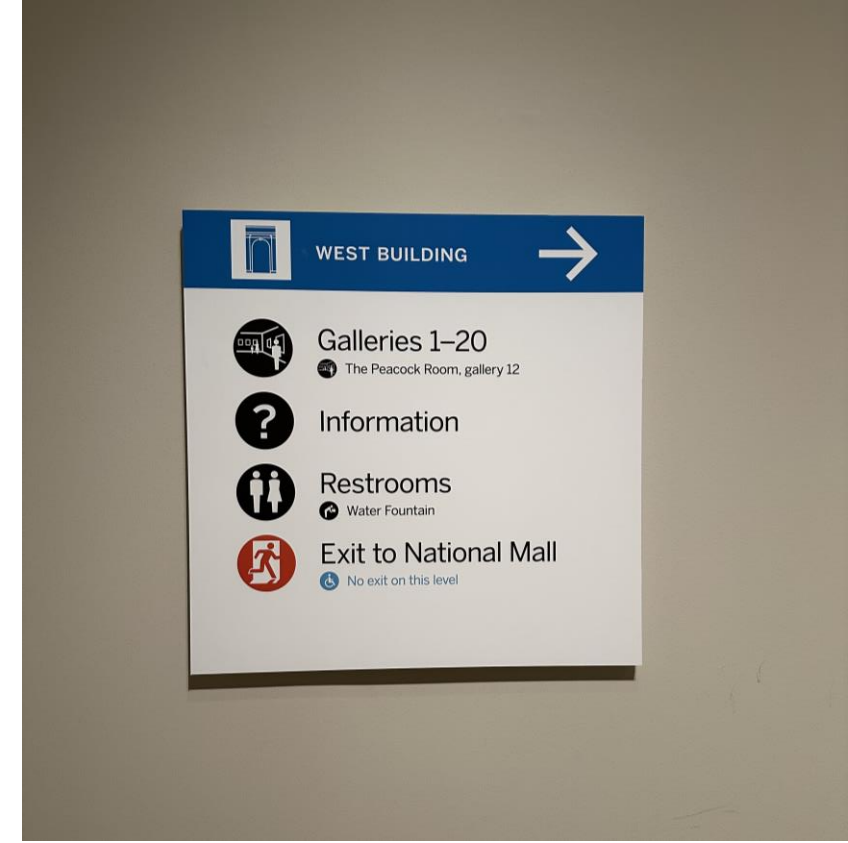
The art at the Freer is very delicate. Visitors can look at the art with their eyes. Some of the art is behind glass to keep it safe. Some of the art is not behind glass.



Please Do Not Touch

It is important that visitors do not touch the art to keep it safe so that other people can enjoy it too. There are signs reminding visitors not to touch the art.





Things to Remember

The Freer is a large museum at the Smithsonian with clear signs to help visitors find their way. Stairs and elevators connect the different floors, making it easy to get around. Visitors can enjoy looking at the art throughout the museum.
