Today, I am going to visit the lemurs at Lemur Island.




Lemur Island is home to many lemurs.

They swim in the water, walk on the island and sit in the sun.




I may see a waterfall that makes loud splashing sounds. It is pretty to look at. I can watch the water fall down over the rocks.
